1. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

1. What is the purpose of this project? Provide a brief description.

On the basis of the Intergovernmental Agreement of the countries of Central Asia, the Republic of Kyrgyzstan may use 24% of volume of a river source from an annual source 50 billion m³ (i.e. 12 billion m³). The significant part (about 23%) of return water is lost during their use. The reasons for unsatisfactory technical condition of irrigation and water-distributive systems are, wear of equipment, application of imperfect methods for watering, and an absence of water-saving technologies. In the last years, the stable tendency of growth of unproductive losses of water is marked, and 90% of them are losses in irrigation. Water in the country is used for household, industrial and agricultural use. The consumption of water for agricultural irrigation is 88% of total use (about 12% of water is for household and industrial consumption).

Rotary Club of Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan, began village water projects in 1999. In cooperation with local communities and administration with financial support from Rotary Clubs of Svalov, Sweden and own Rotary Club of Bishkek contribution, and Soros foundation were constructed water pipeline and catchment chambers in Madaniyat, Tosh, Kosh-Korgon, Kara-Dobo and Iskra in Chui region <http://www.rotarywater.org/projects/rotary_bishkek.php>. Project in Year 2006 will be targeted on the construction water supply systems for Shamsi, Kosh-Kashat, Kairma, Onbirjylga, Progress, Kosh-Korgon, Kara-Dobo, Sadovoe, Sailyk, Shon-Jar, Karagul villages of Chui region (Shamsi, Onbirjylga and Kosh-Korgon local administrations) in Northern Kyrgyzstan just to the east of the capital city of Bishkek.. These water supply systems will provide clean water to 15000 people. The design of the pipeline scheme and schedule of the works provided in attachments.

2. How will it meet the needs of the community?

During Soviet times most of rural Kyrgyzstan was served by water supply systems, usually these were based upon electrical pumping from deep wells. With the collapse of the Soviet Union, many of the rural water systems fell into disrepair as there was little money available to maintain the electrical equipment. Indeed, the collapse of rural water supply systems in this country since the fall of the command economy has become a national calamity. The Asian Development Bank and the World Bank both fund programs for the reconstruction and repair of the worst cases, with funding exceeding \$50million. The plan now is to tap into the local springs located in the mountains above the villages and convert water delivery into gravity systems. Not all village water systems are funded by these organizations, and the villages Shamsi, Kosh-Kashat, Kairma, Onbirjylga, Progress, Kosh-Korgon, Kara-Dobo, Sadovoe, Sailyk, Shon-Jar, Karagul are not so included.

3. How will the host and international partners communicate and work together to implement this project? Please provide specific examples of activities.

Communications between the partnered organizations will be conducted primarily through email with all project information published on a public website at www.RotaryWater.org.

The Rotary Club of Bishkek will start the project with a meeting with residents of the above listed villages, regional and village authorities, administrators, heads of local associations to hear their opinion and proposals concerning the water supply issue. Then, jointly with village activists a working group will be formed. The task of this working group will be to establish a Water Users Association (WUA) in each village by election.

The WUA will be responsible for continuing operation of the water supply system. They will be making decision regarding implementation of the project, continued operation, use and maintenance of the village water supply system. Unemployed welders, pipe layers, tractor and bulldozer operators, hydrological engineers and builders are available in every village. A team of necessary specialists will be organized from this locally available work force.

This is an extension of an ongoing project by the Rotary Club of Bishkek. During the initial phase of the project analysis of water from the gorge springs was carried out. Specialists from the Republican Sanitary-Epidemiological Station (SES) were involved. The analysis is necessary to ensure the bacteriological and chemical safety of the springs. Besides after all the required procedures of application to the Kyrgyzstan Water Supply Department a license for water use from the springs will be obtained.



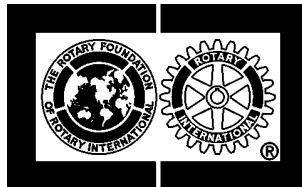

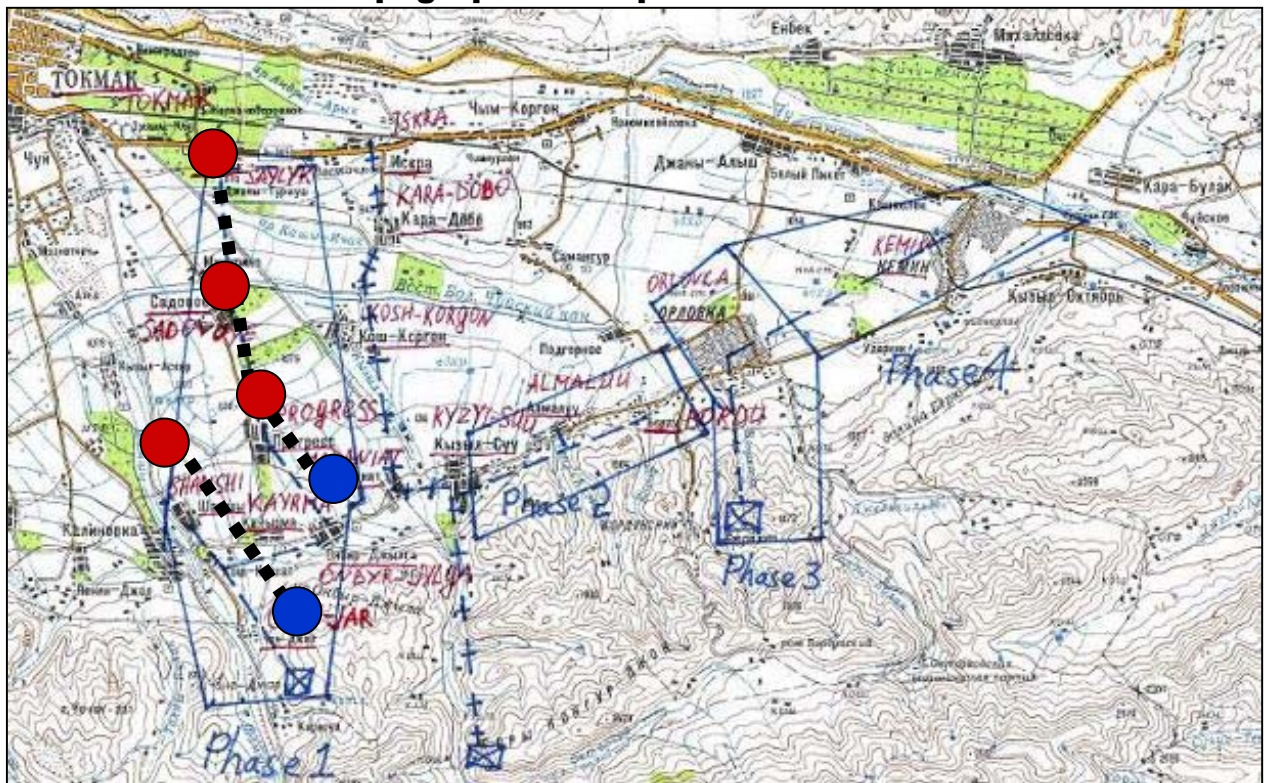

around Tokmak, east of the capital city of Bishkek

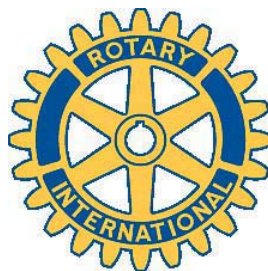


Topographical map of Tokmak area

Indeed, the collapse of rural water supply systems in this country since the fall of the command economy has become a national calamity. The Asian Development Bank and the World Bank both fund programs for the reconstruction and repair of the worst cases, with funding exceeding \$50million. The plan now is to tap into the local springs located in the mountains above the villages and convert water delivery into gravity systems. Not all village water systems are funded by these organizations, and the villages Madaniyal, Kosh-Korgon, Kara- Dobb, Internrar, Vostochnoye and Iskra are not so included.

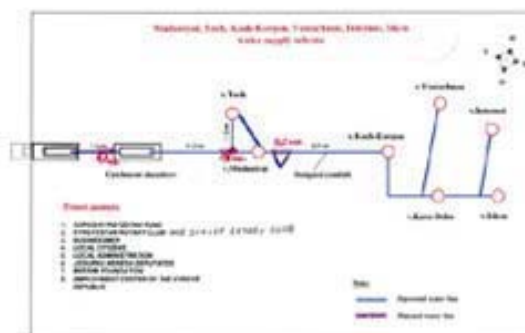


Figure 1. Pipeline scheme

The overall project to supply water to these villages has been underway since 1999 and has been built in phases. In the first phase the Soros Foundation provided \$4,000 for the purchase of supplies and pipe to build an initial 4km of line. In 2000 Soros Foundation funded an additional \$6,000 for a pipeline extension and for this phase. The Rotary Club of Bishkek and the Rotary Club of Svalov in Sweden , District 2390, donated additionally \$2,000 each. Now the villagers have requested \$ 6,000 from Rotary for a third extension of the line. When all is completed, the water system will serve 10,000 people.

It should be noted that the donated funds are used to buy the pipe and other supplies; the labor of digging the ditches and installing the line is provided by the village people themselves under the “Ashar” system of community work (much like a community barn- raising on the American frontier in the nineteenth century). This is very good value for money, and it is believed that the Rotary/Soros efforts are some of the most people and cost effective in the foreign aid sector.

Until arrival of the pipeline, the villagers had to go three to four km for water either from adjunct villages or streams. This caused a sharp rise in water-borne diseases, not only for people but for farm animals also. For example, a three year bull-calf needs up to 200 liters of water per day and the lack of safe water led many farmers to give up traditional cattle breeding. This in turn decreased family income and reduced family diets. The situation was so difficult that during the planning for the initial section of the pipeline it became apparent that many people had lost their faith in anyone or anything, nor could they be certain of their own abilities.



The paradox is that even with the loss of faith; many experts were available from the local population: including hydrological and civil engineers, welders, pipe layers, and tractor and bulldozer operators. What were needed were a modest amount of money and the mobilization of people by local leaders who could see beyond the immediate despair. In fact within a month of the start of construction, it is reported that people began to regain their confidence



and realize that the pipeline would improve their lives. They saw from day to day that their hope for safe water was realistic and needed only their own physical labor and know-how to achieve it.

The village peoples can be proud of their work in completing the first phases of the pipeline, and Soros Foundation and Rotary can likewise be proud of their contribution. But what appears to be the most important beneficial result of this activity is the restoration of the self-confidence of the local residents.



At the completion of the pipeline and delivery of water, a considerable amount of community enthusiasm remained and several other projects were completed. In the Madaniyat village a memorial to the soldiers of the Great Patriotic War (World War 2) was constructed, the social club in the same village was reconstructed by the “Ashar” method, an apple orchard was replanted and the old trees pruned, a telephone exchange and radio receiver were constructed and computers were supplied to the village schools.

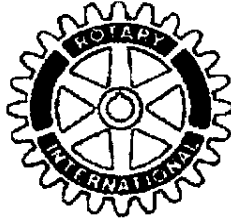

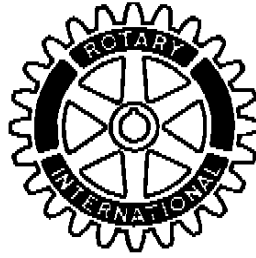

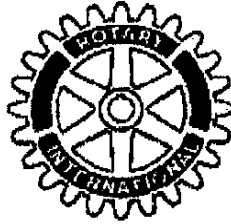
